

Kenny Scharf well-known for his colorful, fantastical, Pop-Surrealist paintings makes fun of American popular culture. Tongue-incheek, Scharf has called this phenomenon, Jetsonism, after the cosmic family cartoon, The Jetsons. Scharf himself presents a true aura of authenticity; viewing himself as a bone-fide space-age junk-food LA/East Village suburban downtown part-time androgyne beach bum T.V. flower child. To this day, his work repeatedly underscores the ritual aspects of fun, how enjoyment of life is a keystone of the sacred, how it has become increasingly difficult to have a little honest pleasure in our society. In Lixoball, Scharf uses objects he found on the beaches of Portugal-literally trash, or lixo in Portuguese-to bring colorful meaning to what our culture has identified as disposable or used up. The ultimate recycler, Scharf uses what we have discarded to represent our identity-we are what we have left behind.
